Flamenco and its origins

Three very distinct phases are recognizable in the evolution of Flamenco. The arrival of the gypsies to Spain, the romantic era, and Franco's dictatorship.

The gypsies arrived in the 15th century and came from countries like India, Iran, and Egypt. They amalgamated all the folk dances they encountered on their journey and created their art of expression.

During the 18th and 19th centuries, flamenco gained more recognition and became prominent in the literature and arts.

In the late 19th century, flamenco became more commercialized and its popularity increased with the opening of cafes and bars where evening visitors were entertained by its songs and dance.

A combination of gypsy flamenco and opera, flamenco transformed into a popular culture amongst the aristocrats and elites.

The flamenco dance as we know it today was adopted as a national dance by the Spanish dictator, Francisco Franco during his power from 1939 to 1975.
