



YOUR TEACHER SAYS

1. You will read a sentence to your students and follow it up by saying: ... *and your teacher says, it's true/false.*
Example: Cats are better pets than dogs... *and your teacher says, it's true.*
2. Give your students a moment to think about this and they must then agree or disagree with you, and tell you briefly why.
3. Make some sentences *true and some false.* Have fun!
4. Depending on the size of your class, you can allow multiple students to answer/ debate your statement.

1. The potato is a vegetable.

And your teacher says it's true/false.

2. The potato is the best vegetable. Ever.

And your teacher says it's true/false.

3. Potatoes grow above the ground.

And your teacher says it's true/false.

4. There are many ways to cook potatoes.

And your teacher says it's true/false.

5. Instant potatoes taste like real potatoes.

And your teacher says it's true/false.

6. French fries with mayonnaise are better than those with ketchup.

And your teacher says it's true/false.

7. There are over a thousand different types of potatoes.

(It's a fact) And your teacher says it's true/false.

8. The English word potato comes from a Spanish word, Patata.

(It's true) And your teacher says it's true/false.

9. A potato skin is healthier than flesh. *(False, they are equal)*

And your teacher says it's true/false.

10. You can bake, roast, boil, or mash potatoes.

Ask students if anyone can explain a “baked potato”?

What is a “roast” potato? What else can we roast?

How do we “boil” a potato?

Do we bake, roast, or boil a potato when we want to make “mashed potatoes”?
