Certainty

The modal verbs will, shall, can, and must can be used to express certainty.

You will find your wallet.

I shall be late because I have a dental appointment.

You can't pay so much for that small room.

I must go to class because I have an exam.

Uncertainty

The modal verbs **may**, **could**, **can**, or **might** can be used to express uncertainty.

I may be there this evening or I may not.

We might go on a cruise again.

We could wait and see if the weather clears up by tomorrow.

India can be very warm in May.
