Types of Pronouns in this Exercise

Subject Pronouns: I, you, he, she, it, we, they

Example: they take a coffee break

Object Pronouns: me, you, him, her, it, us, them

Example: Emma joins them

Possessive Adjectives: my, your, his, her, its, our, their

Example: Tom brings his blue mug

Possessive Pronouns: mine, yours, his, hers, its, ours, theirs

Example: "Yes, it's mine"
