

MAY VS WOULD

A. May vs. Would: Simple Introduction

Teacher Discussion Points

"May" is used for:

1. Asking for permission

"May I open the window?"

2. Giving permission

"Yes, you may open it."

3. Possibility

"It may rain later today."

"Would" is used for:

1. Polite requests

"Would you pass the salt, please?"

2. Offers

"Would you like some tea?"

3. Preferences

"I would prefer coffee instead."

B. Confusing Examples to Discuss

Ask students which is correct and why:

- "May I help you?" / "Would I help you?" (First is correct asking permission to help)
- "May you like this gift?" / "Would you like this gift?" (Second is correct offering something)
- "It may be cold tomorrow." / "It would be cold tomorrow." (First is correct for possibility)
- "May you pass me the book?" / "Would you pass me the book?" (Second is correct for polite requests)

C. Fill-in-the-Gap Activity

Read each sentence aloud, pausing at the gap. Ask students to choose *may* or *would*.

Student Practice Activities

A. Situation Cards

Situation Cards:

- You want to leave the classroom
- You want to offer a snack to a classmate
- You're not sure if your friend is coming to the party
- You need a favor from someone
- You want to ask permission to use the bathroom
- You want to offer help to your teacher
- You think it's possible that the bus will be late
- You want to ask for a second serving of food politely
- You aren't sure if your answer is correct
- You want to borrow something from a classmate

- 2. Choose one of the situations below
- 3. Create a short dialogue using "may" and "would" correctly
- 4. Practice your dialogue
- 5. Perform it for the class

Role Play Situations

Restaurant Scene

- One student is the customer
- One student is the waiter/waitress
- Use "would" for ordering and offering
- Use "may" for asking permission

Classroom Scene

- One student is a student
- One student is the teacher
- Use "may" to ask for permission
- Use "would" for polite requests

Shopping Scene

- One student is a customer
- One student is a shop assistant
- Use "would" to ask for items politely
- Use "may" for possibilities ("This shirt may be too small")

Friends Planning Scene

- Both students are friends planning the weekend
- Use "may" for possibilities ("It may rain on Saturday")
- Use "would" for preferences ("I would prefer to go to the movies")
