

MUCH & MANY

Much or Many? A Simple Guide for Beginners

Introduction

"Much" and "Many" are used when talking about quantity, but they're used in different situations. Here's a quick way to remember:

Much → Used with uncountable nouns (things we can't count easily, like water, rice, or money).

Many → Used with countable nouns (things we can count, like apples, books, or chairs).

Quick Rules

- ✓ Use much with singular, uncountable nouns:
 - \times I have much books. \rightarrow $\boxed{\ }$ I have many books.
 - X There aren't many milk. $\rightarrow V$ There isn't much milk.
- Use many with plural, countable nouns:
 - X There isn't much chairs. → V There aren't many chairs.
