



## MUCH & MANY

1. How many books **are/is** in your bag?  
Are books countable or uncountable?
2. How much water **is/are** there in your bottle?  
Is water countable or uncountable?
3. How much hair **do/does** you have on your head?  
Is hair countable or uncountable?

**Write this on the board:**

How \_\_\_\_\_ people are there in your family?

Students to answer using complete sentences:

There **are** \_\_\_\_\_ people in my family.      three, four, five...  
Are people countable or uncountable?

**Write this on the board:**

Students to answer using  
complete sentences:

I have \_\_\_\_\_ books.  
I have \_\_\_\_\_ cousins.  
There are \_\_\_\_\_ students in this school.

I have **many** books. [countable or uncountable?]      Four, five... or many.  
I have **many** cousins. [countable or uncountable?]      Two, three... or many.  
There are **many** students in this school. [countable or uncountable?]

**Write this on the board:**

Students to answer using  
complete sentences:

How \_\_\_\_\_ sugar do you eat every day?  
I eat too \_\_\_\_\_ sugar every day.  
How \_\_\_\_\_ water is in the dam?

How **much** sugar do you eat every day? [countable or uncountable?]  
I eat too **much** sugar every day.  
How **much** water is in the dam?

### Much / Many Rule

When we talk about **much or many** people often speak of **countable nouns** and **uncountable nouns**.

Use **many** if the noun is countable - for example, apples, children, cars, tables, etc.

Use **much** if the noun is uncountable - for example, milk, water, coffee, sand, etc.

**More examples:**

I don't have **much** money.  
I read **many** books during the vacation.  
My brother eats too **much** chocolate.

**Countable nouns** can be singular or plural. When they are plural, these nouns can be used with a number and that's why they are called **countable nouns**.

Countable nouns = *many*. *[546 friends on social media]*

**Uncountable nouns** can only be singular. We do not use these nouns with a number and that's why they are called **uncountable nouns**.

Uncountable nouns = *much*. *[We spend too much money on a weekend]*

*! Now you know we use many with countable nouns and much with uncountable nouns.!*
