Calendar of Events

Hello, class! Today we are going to talk about something that helps us plan our lives and remember special days: **events, months, and dates.**

A **calendar** is a tool we use to see the days, weeks, and months of the year. Think of it as a map for time! There are 12 months in a year, and each month has a different number of days. Knowing the months and the days of the week helps us know when special events and holidays are happening.

For example, your birthday is an event that happens on a specific date in a specific month. Christmas is an event that happens on December 25th every year. We also have seasons, which are the four main parts of the year: spring, summer, autumn, and winter. Each season happens during specific months.

In this lesson, we are going to learn how to talk about dates, put events in order, and understand how our calendars work.
