

## I HATE DOING THE DISHES

### **Grammar Explanation: What Are Gerunds?**

Read the explanation below to understand gerunds.

A **gerund** is a verb form ending in **-ing** that acts as a noun. For example, in the sentence "I hate doing the dishes," "doing" is a gerund because it's the thing (noun) that I hate. Gerunds are often used to talk about activities, like chores or hobbies.

### **Examples from the Story:**

- "Mia hated doing the dishes more than anything." (Doing is the gerund, acting as the thing Mia hates.)
- "She turned **dishwashing** into a dance party." (**Dishwashing** is a gerund, describing the activity.)
- "Scrubbing made her want to scream." (Scrubbing is the gerund, acting as the subject of the sentence.)

#### Common Uses of Gerunds:

- 1. As the **subject** of a sentence: **Cooking** is fun for some people.
- 2. As the **object** of a verb: I enjoy **reading** books.
- 3. After prepositions: She's tired of **cleaning** the kitchen.
- 4. After certain verbs (like hate, love, enjoy): Mia hates **doing** chores.
