##### Sample prompts for interviewers:

*“Why is it important for a boss to be fair?”*

*“How does a supportive boss help employees?”*

*“Can you give an example of a decisive boss?”*

#### Feedback:

*Class roundup — Share your strongest adjective choice and short explanation.*

#### Example:

*“A good boss is supportive because they help employees when they have problems.”*

##### Sample candidate answers:

*“My ideal boss is organized, because clear plans make work easier.”*

*“I prefer a boss who is respectful, since it creates a positive atmosphere.”*

*“A confident boss inspires the team to trust their decisions.”*
