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Part 1 – The Tourist

Part 2 – The Lost Visitor

Your partner is lost.

They tell you:

“I was walking along Main Street, but I think I went the wrong way. I can see the cinema.”

You need to help them get to the **restaurant**.

Give clear directions.

Then your partner repeats the directions.

Did they understand you correctly?

Part 3 – You Give Bad Directions!

Your partner gives you directions.

But they deliberately leave out one important piece of information.

For example:

“Go along Main Street and turn right.”

Ask a question.

“Where should I turn?”

or

“Which street?”

or

“What will I see?”

Keep asking questions until you have enough information.

Then change roles.



Part 4 – The School Challenge

Imagine you are showing a new student around your school.

The student starts at the **main entrance**.

They need to find:

1. The headmaster's office
2. The canteen
3. The toilets
4. The sports field

You don't have a map.

You must give directions using:

- ☐ go straight
- ☐ turn left/right
- ☐ go past
- ☐ next to
- ☐ opposite
- ☐ at the end
- ☐ on your left/right

Choose **two destinations** and explain the routes.

Part 5 – Final Challenge: The Information Gap

Work with a partner.

Student A

You have a secret destination.

Choose one:

- bank
- school
- cinema
- hospital
- park
- restaurant
- supermarket
- Talkmor Coffee

Student B

Listen carefully.

Follow the directions on the map.

At the end, guess the destination.

“I think you're taking me to _____.”

If you are wrong, Student A must explain the directions again.

Then change roles.

Your partner **doesn't know** your destination.

Give directions from “**You are here**” without saying the name.

REAL ENGLISH BOX

A natural directions conversation

A: “Excuse me, could you tell me how to get to the station?”

B: “Sure. Go straight along this road and turn left at the bank.”

A: “The bank on the corner?”

B: “Yes. Go past the bank and you'll see the station on your right.”

A: “So I turn left at the bank and go past it?”

B: “Exactly.”

A: “Great. Thanks for your help.”

B: “No problem.”
